Summary. The history of Ukrainian-Polish relations in the twentieth century is among those problems of historical studies which are considered to have been insufficiently examined up to now. There are no special works which provide a comprehensive treatment of the complex and controversial processes involved in the relations of these two nations. The fact that some pages of our shared history have not been adequately investigated opens the door for some political forces to introduce speculation about them, and to take advantage of this in some manner. If this topic is researched on a scientific level, this possibility is eliminated, and an opportunity is created for building relations between Ukraine and Poland, between these neighbouring peoples, on a foundation of truth and of an objective reconstruction of their common history, and to acquaint broad segments of their respective societies with these realities.

Scientific activity of the school. In recent times thirteen workshops have been held that deal with issues of Ukrainian-Polish relations during the period from 1918 to 1947. Eleven volumes of the scientific journals "Poland and Ukraine: Difficult questions" have been published, containing reports, discus-

sion materials, and a chronology of events in Volyn and Galicia during the period from 1939 to 1945.

More than 350 research works centering on the school's thematic area have been published, including monographs and 18 educational handbooks. Members of the school have been involved in the development of four studies with government funding and international grants. Eleven Ph. D. (*Kandydat*) and one Ph. D. (*Doctorak*) theses have been prepared. Professor B. Zabrovarny and Associate Professor V. Dmytruk have worked with success in this school.
