Summary. The basic patternsof western and eastern Slavic literatures, history, documentary writing and poetics and their typological and specific manifestations were studied using Belarusian, Polish, Russian and Ukrainian literature as source material. Modern approaches such as comparative literary studies, narratology, and intertextualization have been applied. Much attention is devoted to the terminological systems of Slavic literatures and Volhynian texts.

Scientific activity of the school. More than 550 articles have been published in scientific journals of Ukraine, Belarus, Poland, and the Russian Federation. Special issues of periodicals have been published that are devoted to literature-associated anniversary dates such as those of Pushkin, Gogol, Dostoevsky and Lesya Ukrainka. Thirteen scientific conferences and seminars (eleven international and two national) have been organized and conducted.
